### PROFILES: HIGH SCHOOL HOCKEY

### EASTERN HIGH SCHOOL HOCKEY LEAGUE

The Eastern High School Hockey League is the area's youngest high school league. Just completing its third season of operation, the EHSHL has shown that there is room for a fourth league in the area.

Comprised of ten teams, the Delaware County based league competes exclusively at the Skatium in Havertown. Formed to achieve the most in competitive spirit, the leadership felt that by playing out of one rink the players would reap benefits with utmost efficiency.

For the most part the small league concept has proved highly competitive, with a minimum of blowouts. Every night of action at the Skatium provides excitement and enjoyment for the fans.

The league was placed into transition this year with a new President Howard Imhof and a new Commissioner Joe Moderski, who along with an all new Executive Committee took the league to its largest attendance year ever. Each and every officer volunteers his or her time for the sake of the players, for the love of the sport.

The league was founded in 1981 by former president and now ICSHL Commissioner Jack Hunt, the ICSHL's Executive Director Mary Cifone and a group of other high school hockey leaders who shared similar ideals and beliefs about the way high school hockey should be.

Again this year, the EHSHL held all-star games for the benefit of charities, conducted a ''Player of the Week'' poll and published 'ICE CHIPS', a weekly publication filled with information about the league.

Haverford High finished first in the regular season, while Malvern was hot on their heels. But in the playoffs, Monsignor Bonner stunned Malvern and Springfield upset Haverford to play one of the best final rounds in the league's history.

### SUBURBAN HIGH SCHOOL HOCKEY LEAGUE

The old saying of "You've come a long way baby," best fits the Suburban High School Hockey League.

Now in its twelfth year of existence, the league has grown from a fledgling 5 teams to 17 and has also improved its level of play in that time.

The league's president, Andy Richards, has been around since the inception. He remembers the early years of the league, before a powerful Abington High School team captured a Pennsylvania state title in 1975.

In the last four seasons, the powerhouse of the SHSHL has been Germantown Academy, a small private school, from Fort Washington. Along with the defending Flyers Cup champs, Archbishop Wood and Council Rock have proven to be tough competition along the way.

Last year, and this year, Cherry Hill East and Bishop Eustace, two South Jersey teams proved tough competition all year long, with Cherry Hill East being the dominant team in the regular season before losing to Council Rock in the league finals two games to one.

Skating out of two rinks, The Face-Off Circle and the Wintersports Arena, the SHSHL gives over three hundred youngsters an opportunity to play hockey and have fun.

### LOWER BUCKS COUNTY SCHOLASTIC HOCKEY LEAGUE

The Lower Bucks County Scholastic Hockey League, now operating in its ninth season, provides the players of the Northeast Philadelphia and Bristol-Levittown area with exciting competition.

The league was originally formed with six teams and had at one time grown as large as eight teams, but has reduced itself to five teams this year.

Like the EHSHL, the Lower Bucks County Scholastic Hockey League has the luxury of playing all of its games out of one location, the Grundy Recreation Center in Bristol. The rink's general manager, Paul Saylor, has served as the league's commissioner since its inception, while Milton Batley, the league's second year president has had a tremendous positive impact in making the league strong organizationally.

Bishop Egan has represented the league in the Flyers Cup twice while Archbishop Ryan will represent it for the third time. For the first time ever, the Lower Bucks County Scholastic Hockey League is sending their regular season champion as opposed to the playoff victor. "We wanted to make the regular season more meaningful," said President Milton Batley.

The strong teams this year have been Ryan, Bishop Egan and Pennsbury. All are well coached, disciplined teams. These three teams have given fans of the LBCSHL lots of excitement and are promising even more for the future.

### INTER-COUNTY SCHOLASTIC HOCKEY LEAGUE

The Inter-County Scholastic Hockey League is the area's first and longest continuing operating high school hockey league in the southeastern Pennsylvania area.

Founded in 1969 by Kurt Wallin and Marshall Moglovkin, the league was started to give more boys the opportunity to play hockey in the Philadelphia and surrounding suburban area.

At one time, the ICSHL was the largest league of its type in the state, numbering 32 teams. Strong in tradition, the ICSHL has prided themselves in having the strongest members on the ice of the Philadelphia area leagues over the years.

With the event of the Flyers Cup, in 1980, it was Archbishop Carroll of the ICSHL, that went on to become the first champion of what has become a very coveted award. In 1982, West Chester won the Pennsylvania Cup, the statewide championship, as had Carroll in 1981.

The ICSHL has produced many quality players. These players, the Scott Chamness, Carmen D Gandomenico, Rick Turnbull, Scott Fack, and Jaff White, all have brought fame and recognition to the ICSH.

Conestoga High School, long a power in the ICSHL, has resurfaced after a series of .500 seasons. In the past the Pioneers had won league titles at the reins of Jim Shute.

Now numbering nine teams, the ICSHL still provides competition and excitement for nearly two hundred Main Line hockey players.

# FLYERS CUP EXPERIENCE

The participants use the term "Super Bowl" to

describe the Flyers Cup.

That's no exaggeration of the impact the Flyers Cup has on the Delaware Valley's scholastic hockey players, even if the comparison is to another sport.

"This is the Stanley Cup," said Archbishop Ryan coach Bob Ipri. "To the kids it's the ultimate. From day one, when we started tryouts, this was uppermost in their minds. You don't want to say, 'we'll breeze through our league,' but when you get right down to it, this is on their mind."

It's exciting, a different experience for scholatic players, and a treasured memory of high school

play.

"We always set the Flyers Cup as a goal," said Bruce Craig, former coach of two-time defending champion Germantown Academy. "The kids key on it and that's where you aim.

"It's such a first class experience. It's great for the kids. In the Suburban League, we usually didn't see any fans, even in the playoffs. But in the Flyers Cup,

they came out.

"It's good to see the kids get notoriety, but it was good for me, too. Just to hear the people all around

the bench yell in your ear all the time.

"It's the ultimate experience in high school hockey," said Malvern Prep coach Bill Galli. "We sure never had anything like that when I was in high school."

The Flyers Cup now is five years old and is entering a new phase. There is a new location, new sponsors, and some new faces. The popular "win three" format of the past two Cups has, of course,

been retained.
Once again the champions of the four scholastic hockey leagues in Southeastern Pennsylvania — the Eastern League, the Inter-County League, the Lower Bucks County League, and the Suburban League — will provide the four-team field.

But the Cup has moved from its original location at the University of Pennsylvania to the Skatium in Havertown to take advantage of the hotbed of youth

hockey activity in the suburbs.

The Philadelphia Flyers will provide sponsorship, along with the Pepsi Cola Bottlers of the Delaware Valley, Stouffer's Valley Forge Inn, Gold Medal

Sporting Goods and Atari Video Games.

The format is simple — the first team to win three games wins the Flyers Cup. In the March 19th opening rounds, the champions of the Lower Bucks County League will meet the champs of the Suburban Hockey League; while the champion of the Inter-County League takes on the champ of the Eastern League.

In the second round, to be played Wednesday, March 21st, the two first-night winners will meet; so will the two first-night losers. At the end of the night's action, the team which holds a 2-0 record will

get a bye into the final round on Tuesday, March 27th. The team which went 0-2 will be eliminated.

The third round, to be played Monday, March 26th, will match up the two schools with 1-1 records. The winner of that game will meet the unbeaten team in the final game Tuesday, March 27th, in a "winner-take-all" brawl.

All four past champions, by the way, have come from either the Inter-County or the Suburban Leagues. Archbishop Carroll of the Inter-County League won the first two Cups. Germantown Academy of the Suburban League won the last two.

But one the things that makes this year's competition fascinating is the balance of the field—there is no clear cut favorite and any of the four leagues could supply the winner. Both Carroll and Germantown Academy were such overwhelming favorites in their two Cup years that the competition did little more than certify the pre-Cup predictions.



Haverford went through the Eastern League's regular season unbeaten, with 13 wins and three ties. The Fords are built on goaltending, with Hiram Pines and Jay Robinson, plus defense. The two defensive pairings are Mike Guss and Eric Peters, with Mike Cleary teaming with Fran Morrisey. Pines, also an outstanding student, was awarded the Eastern League's \$1,000 college scholarship last month.

"They work very well together," said coach Scott Mason. "They talk back there and do a lot of things they're supposed to do, but which high school kids often don't do."

The finalists of the Inter-County League — West Chester and Conestoga — have danced this dance before. West Chester represented the Inter-County in the Flyers Cup two years ago and went to the fifth and final game of the league finals last year. Conestoga prevailed in that game, and may well make it two in a row.

Conestoga may have more depth than any other squad in the Cup.

"We don't just look to two or three players," said coach John Titus, "which is unusual in high school hockey. We have 12 guys we can call on at any time in a game, and we have a lot of confidence in all of them."

The Pioneers, nearly all of whom played on last year's Inter-County playoff champion, are Cup veterans.

"Our goal all season was to get back to the Flyers Cup," Titus said. "We wanted to improve all year long so we could get there and say, 'we're back - and we should do better."

West Chester boasts one of the area's very best all-around talents in senior Doug Bowman. Once the area's best defenseman, Bowman was moved to left wing by coach Dave Mitchell to better utilize his skating skills.

"It makes it tougher for others to defend against him when he's moving around," Mitchell said. "When we're on the power play, or when we're killing penalties, he goes back to defense."

One of these talented teams will emerge as the 1984 Flyers Cup champion — the Super Bowl of scholastic hockey.
