PROFILES: HIGH SCHOOL HOCKEY

EASTERN HIGH SCHOOL HOCKEY LEAGUE

The Eastern High School Hockey League is the area's youngest high school league. Just completing its fourth season of operation, the EHSHL has developed a powerhouse of talent and excitement for the Delaware County hockey faithful.

Comprised of ten teams, the Delaware County based league competes at the Skatium in Havertown. This was done to achieve the most in competitive spirit, the EHSHL's leadership felt that by playing out of one rink the players would reap benefits with utmost efficiency.

For the most part the small league concept has proved highly competitive, with a minimum of blowouts. Every night of action at the Skatium provides excitement and enjoyment for the fans.

The league was founded by Jack Hunt, president and past president of the ICSHL, Mary Cifone, executive director, and a group of other high school hockey leaders who shared similar ideas and beliefs about the way high school hockey should be. Each and every officer volunteers his or her time for the sake of the players, for the love of the sport. Second year commissioner Joe Moderski and first year president Dave Mulvaney have provided a strong leadership team for the league.

Again this year, the EHSHL held all-star games for the benefit of charities, and published 'ICE CHIPS', a weekly publication filled with information about the league.

Still young, the Eastern High School Hockey League has proven that it will be around for a long, long time.

LOWER BUCKS COUNTY SCHOLASTIC HOCKEY LEAGUE

The Lower Bucks County Scholastic Hockey League, now operating in its tenth season, provides the players of the Northeast Philadelphia and Bristol-Levittown area with exciting competition.

The league was originally formed with six teams and had at one time grown as large as eight teams. For the past two seasons the league has skated five teams.

Like the EHSHL, the Lower Bucks County Scholastic Hockey League has the luxury of playing all of its games out of one location, the Grundy Recreation Center in Bristol. The rink's general manager, Paul Saylor, has served as the league's commissioner since its inception, while Milton Batley, the league's third year president has had a tremendous positive impact in making the league strong organizationally.

Bishop Egan has represented the league in the Flyers Cup twice, while Archbishop Ryan will represent it for the fourth time. Ryan has won the Commissioners Cup five times as has Bishop Egan, with Pennsbury winning it once.

The strong teams this year have been Ryan and Pennsbury. Both are well coached, disciplined teams. These two teams have given fans of the LBCSHL lots of excitement and are promising even more for the future.

INTER-COUNTY SCHOLASTIC HOCKEY LEAGUE

The Inter-County Scholastic Hockey League is the area's first and longest continuing operating high school hockey league in the southeastern Pennsylvania area.

Founded in 1969 by Kurt Wallin and Marshall Moglovkin, the league was started to give more boys the opportunity to play hockey in the Philadelphia and surrounding suburban area.

At one time, the ICSHL was the largest league of its type in the state, numbering 32 teams. Strong in tradition, the ICSHL has prided themselves in having the strongest members on the ice of the Philadelphia area leagues over the years.

With the advent of the Flyers Cup, in 1980, it was Archbishop Carroll of the ICSHL, that went on to become the first champion of what has become a very coveted award. In 1982, West Chester won the Pennsylvania Cup, the statewide championship, as had Carroll in 1981.

The ICSHL has produced many quality players. These players, like Scott Chamness, Carmen DiGiandomenico, Rick Turnbull, Scott Relick, and Jeff White, all have brought fame and recognition to the ICSHL.

Conestoga High School, long a power in the ICSHL, has resurfaced after a series of .500 seasons. In the past the Pioneers had won league titles at the reins of Jim Shute. The past two years, the John Titus coached squad has entered the Flyers Cup frey, but has yet to win a game.

Reduced to only seven teams, the ICSHL still provides competition and excitement for over one hundred and fifty hockey players in Chester and Montgomery counties.

SUBURBAN HIGH SCHOOL HOCKEY LEAGUE

The old saying of "You've come a long way baby," best fits the Suburban High School Hockey League.

Now in its thirteenth year of existence, the league has grown from a fledgling 5 teams to 12 and has also improved its level of play in that time.

The league's president, Andy Richards, has been around since the inception. He remembers the early years of the league, before a powerful Abington High School team captured a Pennsylvania state title in 1975.

In the past, the powerhouse of the SHSHL has been Germantown Academy, a small private school, from Fort Washington. This year, Cherry Hill East and Bishop Eustace, two South Jersey teams, proved tough competition all year long, in the top spots along with Council Rock.

Skating out of two rinks, The Face-Off Circle and the Wintersports Arena, the SHSHL gives over three hundred youngsters an opportunity to play hockey and have fun.

FLYERS CUP '85 PREVIEW

This year's Flyers Cup competition features a pair of familiar names. Conestoga High returns as the representative of the Intercounty Scholastic Hockey League. Last year's Eastern High School Hockey League's representative, Monsignor Bonner, was eliminated in the semifinals of this year's EHSHL playoffs.

In last year's Flyers Cup at the Skatium, the Cup was won by the Raiders of Archbishop Ryan, who accomplished a rare scholastic hockey "triple". The Lower Bucks Scholastic Hockey League, the Commissioner's Cup (emblematic of the LBSHL) and the Flyers Cup. They finished their season with a 16-1 record.

"We had a real good team last year, but we lost over half that team through graduation," said Ryan Coach Bob Ipri. "We lost eight players, and we only had 17 on the team. Despite the loss of players, this year's team has come back to play a pretty good season. We won the regular season championship, and that automatically gave us a return trip to the Flyers Cup."

The Raiders captured the regular season championship, and then opened post-season play by destroying Father Judge in the league semifinals, 13-2 and 15-1. The Raiders moved into the Commissioner's Cup final series with a

10-2-2 record.

Ryan's top unit on the ice consists of the line of center Craig Campagniolio, right wing Steve Nickel, and left wing Mike Panell, along with defensemen John Stafford and Steve Ipri. The Raider's second unit is center Frank Monaco, right wing Vince Anzidio, and left wing Ray Matz, joining with defenders Joe Quattrone and John Monaco. The third line is Ed Zach, Ed Kenna, and Don Gallagher with backliners Keith Hurlburt and Victor Wisniewski. The Raiders' netminders are Frank Skirpan and Steve Boulger.

"It's hard to pin down what style of hockey we play," said Ryan Coach Bob Ipri. "We do whatever we have to do to beat the other team. We try to play a consistent all-around game. There was probably more pressure trying to win the Cup the first time, but you can be sure that our guys want it (the Cup) every bit as much as

they did last year."

Archbishop Ryan's opening round opponent, Conestoga, will be making its third straight appearance in the Flyers Cup. Much to the chagrin of Conestoga's players and supporters, the team is 0-4 over the last two Cup campaigns and has made an early exit from competition both years. The pressure will be on this year, especially for a win in the opening game.

"The first game will be a big one," said Conestoga coach John Titus. "If we get a win in the opener, we should be in pretty good shape. If we don't, the second game is going to be really

tough."

The Conestoga team began the season as the undisputed favorite in the InterCounty League, and they did not disappoint the prognosticators. The Pioneer skaters cruised through their sixteen-game regular season without a loss or a tie, knocked out West Chester in two games in the ICSHL semifinals, and then posted three straight wins over Downingtown in the finals for a playoff sweep. Conestoga enters the Flyers Cup with a 21-0 record.

Conestoga is led by a pair of players who have also gained recognition as members of the Little Flyers squad, Senior Scott Cowan and Junior Center David Smink.

The high-scoring, fast skating duo have been two of the main reasons for Conestoga's on-ice success this year. Both have been to the Flyers

Cup each of the last two seasons.

"We're ready for the Flyers Cup," said Cowan. "We've been looking forward to it for a while. We haven't done too well in Cup play in the past, and we want to make up for it this year."

The Conestoga team has a stable of proven scorers, including Chris Cummings, David Berkowitz, Bill Railton, Chip Graham, Tony Parisi, Mike Diaz, and David Jones. Scot McComas has provided sturdy goaltending all

season long for Conestoga.

In the Suburban High School Hockey League, the powerful Cherry Hill East Squad motored through the regular season with an 18-1-1 record. The Cougars finished on top of the Liberty Division (the league's premier division) with 43½ of a possible 48 season points.



The only blemishes on C.H.E.'s record were a loss and a tie in two of their four games against neighborhood rival, Bishop Eustace. Both teams advanced through the SHSH's quarterfinal round of the playoffs with Cherry Hill East eliminating Washington and Bishop Eustace knocking out Central Bucks. Joining them in the SHSHL's semifinals were Council Rock and Germantown Academy, two teams with Flyers Cup experience.

"I hope we play Eustace in the finals", said Cherry Hill East's All-Star Center Mike Black, because either way it would be a Jersey team going for the Flyers Cup. We're really going for it all the way. Our main goal is to be the first team from Jersey to get in it (the Flyers Cup

Playoffs) and to win it."

Black leads a high-powered C.H.E. team which features no less than four members who also play in the little Flyers organization. Joining Black in the Cougar's first line is Little Flyers right winger Jamie Leach, whose father Reggie was a record-breaking right wing for the Flyers in the 70's. The other little Flyers on Cherry Hill East's squad are Jeff Cook, Ken Hoffman, Steve Hollander, and Scott Hussey.

Last year's champion, Council Rock eliminated Bishop Eustace, to match up against Cherry Hill East in the finals. The Indians led by John Rankel, Mike Cardonick and smooth skating defenseman Jerry Moore could give the Cougars life and death in the finals. Council Rock has a very experienced goaltender in Stan Crooks, who could shut down the potent Cherry Hill East forwards.


In the Eastern High School Hockey League, it had been a two-team race all season between

Haverford High and Malvern Prep, and the same two squads battled it out in the EHSHL Playoff Finals. The Malvern Prep Friars finished as regular season titlists with an undefeated (17-0-1) record. The lone blemish on their record was a tie with the Fords of Haverford High, the league's runners-up.

Haverford, always a perennial powerhouse in the Eastern League, showed Malvern that finishing first doesn't guarantee a berth in the Flyers Cup, as they knocked off the Friars in two straight games, 5-0 and 5-4 in overtime.

Haverford's coach Scott Mason has been fortunate to have the Mighty Mike's, Leen and McKay on the blueline and the potent offense of Little Flyers forward Joe Moran who scored four of the five Haverford goals in the overtime win.

The Haverford High squad is loaded with prolific scorers. Mike Leen, Geoff Skidmore, and Doug Forey are among the league's scoring



leaders. The Fords also count on scoring punch from Craig Walton and Jordy Blum. Haverford's Mike McKay is an All-League defenseman, and Jay Robinson has provided solid goalkeeping the entire season.

However it starts and however it ends, the sixth annual Flyers Cup has something in common with last year's — there is no clear-cut favorite. This will give the fans excitement each and every night.
