



## FRIENDS AND FOES, LOYALTY AND ROYALTY.

For This Group of Players, March Becomes The Craziest Month Of The Year.

March Madness usually refers to the close of the college basketball season and the intensity of the NCAA Tournament.

But for a number of hockey players in the Delaware Valley, particularly those on this year's Philadelphia Junior Flyers Midget AA te am, the phrase is equally fitting for the frenzy March brings.

The Junior Flyers recently completed their regular season by winning their fifth Atlantic League title with an 18-1-1 record in the 11-team league. With that, the team earned a berth in the Tier I Regional Tournament in Morristown, N.J., held March 17, 19 and 20.

And if the Junior Flyers wound up winning the threegame, round-robin tournament, they would have gone on to compete at the National Tournament in Washington, D.C. on April 7, 8 and 9 as one of the country's eight best Midget AA teams.

All of which is great, but considering what the players go through during this stretch of the season, hockey gets rather trying, bot h physically and emotionally.

Consider that the Junior Flyers Midget AA team, one of the premier club teams in the area, consists of players aged 15 to 17 who are generally the top players on their high school teams as well.

What that means is that many of these players wind up battling each other during the week while playing for their high school teams, before getting together weekends to travel and play for the Junior Flyers.

In March, it gets only zanier as the stakes get higher in postseason play, with league titles and the Flyers Cup championship on the line.

"You put your friendship aside when you're playing against each other," said Ryan Andrew, one of Downingtown's key players and a member of the Junior Flyers.

"I think you play harder because everyone's got everything to say about their high school and it's all bragging rights. I enjoy it a nd I love the competition."

Others say skating against their weekend teammates makes them play even harder.

"You go head-to-head with the guys, and it's fun," said West Chester East's Vince Clevenger. "You play to win and you

try your best. We might share a joke on the ice, but it's pretty much all business. You can be friends later."

And being friends doesn't mean your body won't be overlooked on the ice.

"I try not to let it make a difference either way," said

"I just sat there and smiled again," Quinn said. Said East's Drew Cox: "Everybody kids around about it, saying to the guys how we're going to beat you. If you lose, you just make up excuses why you didn't beat them. It's just joking around."

The aspects of the teammates-opponents relationship don't end with the ribbing. When their high school teams go against each other, Junior Flyers players will usually brief their high school teammates about what to expect from their club hockey teammates.

"We always make that clear at the start of the game," Hafer said. "A lot of people have patented moves, and we talk about that in the locker/room. In a way, it's very useful."

Yet, while the combination of playing with and against each other is intriguing and enjoyed by the players, there can be down sides to playing for two teams, the first of which is when club and high school schedules conflict.

Although club teams in the area play weekends, sometimes traveling as far north as Canada doesn't allow a player to get back to one of the Inter-County League's Sunday evening games.

If these players aren't emotionally drained by the end of March, they have at least physically pushed to the limits. Playing for bot h teams means taking to the ice five or six times a week between practice and games. Meanwhile, many of the players are already spen ding weekday afternoons trying out for spring sports such as baseball, lacrosse, tennis or track.

"It gets hectic with baseball tryouts each day, then hockey at night," Clevenger said. "It takes a lot of time, and it takes a lot o ut of you." But despite their own

> version of March Madness, all said they enjoy it. "Sure it's hectic, but it's also the most important part of the year," said Quinn, who also plays baseball for La Salle.

"It's work, but it's also fun," he added. "This is what it's all about."



overlooked on the ice.

"I try not to let it make a difference either way," said Haverford's Zach Hafer. "I won't go out of my way to hit one of the guys, b ut I definitely won't go out of my way to avoid him either."

Naturally, the competition spills over into the Junior Flyers locker room.

Last year, West Chester East lost badly to La Salle twice during the regular season, then upset the Explorers in the Inter-County League playoffs for the title.

This season, La Salle's Donny Quinn was repeatedly reminded of that in the Junior Flyers locker room, particularly by East's Bob Pastore.

"All week he was telling me how bad they were going to beat us, and I just sat there and smiled," Quinn recalled.

The first time the two teams met this season, La Salle romped East, 10-0, The Vikings were held to just four shots, and Quinn propel led his team to the win by scoring three goals and assisting on two others.

The Junior Flyers face off against Dartmouth College's junior varsity team earlier this season in Hanover, NH.





## PENNSYLVANIA DUTCH

A Former Conestoga Standout Follows His Dream... All The Way To The Netherlands.

After earning a degree in economics from Amherst College and getting accepted into medical school at the University of Pennsylvania last spring, Doug Smink wasn't thrilled with another four years of schooling with just one measly summer in between.

So Smink, a former ice hockey standout at Conestoga who became Amherst's top scorer last season, decided to follow his sport for a y ear and combine it with a bit of tourism.

"I hadn't had enough of hockey, and I wanted to

play overseas," Smink said. "It sounded like a fun way to spend the year."

At this moment, Smink is trekking around Europe, hiking the mountains of Switzerland, seeing the sights of France or observing the ruins of Italy, depending on where he last stepped off a train with his Eurail pass.

His three-week-long trip through Europe is a cap to a year in which he followed his fancy and wound up playing a season of hockey in a rather unique place. He played for a semi-professional team in Dordrecht, a city in the southwest portion of the Netherlands.

Smink got the idea through a friend at

Amherst, someone who knew another person who had played for Dordrecht. Smith phoned the Dordr echt coach, Dennis Van Ryjswijk and, coming off his senior season in which he set a team record with 28 goals and 62 points for the Division III Lord Jeffs, convinced him he could be an asset.

On Sept. 1 last year, Smink boarded a plane for the Netherlands, his ticket paid for by the Dordrecht Lions of the Dutch First Division League, with a guaranteed spot in the lineup, "as long as I didn't fall on my face when I got there," Smink said.

He didn't.

Despite being moved back to defense from his center position and having to adapt to larger, Olympic-sized rinks and a country in whi ch Dutch is the official language but most people try to speak

English, Smink said things went well.


The Lions played a 20-game preseason schedule - a means of evaluating the teams before splitting them into the Premier and First Divisions - then went 8-5-1 during the regular season to finish fourth. Smink was one of the team's top defensemen and a regular on the power-play and penalty-killing units.

From the outset,
Smink found himself as
a offensive-minded
defenseman, but he still
fit in. He said the level
of play was not too high
but roughly the same as
in Division II college
hockey here.

"I didn't hold back much," Smink said of his usual rushes up ice

with the puck. "Having played forward so much."
I couldn't help it."

The Lions, like the other 11 teams in the Durch league, are allowed to have three foreign places on their roster. Joining Smink were two other

"The only thing they had to get used to was the European style of hockey," Van Ryjswijk said. "But I was really happy with the guys, no problems at all, and they helped us out. Doug's a great player to have on a team, disciplined, a hard worker and a team player. We were very happy to have him."

As part of his agreement, Smink earned \$700 a month and was given a three-bedroom apartment to share with the two other Americans, a s well as a beat-up 1985 automobile.

"It could get us to the rink," Smink said of the clunker. "In fact, it could probably take us there itself, we were going to the rink so often."

While the Lions practiced three times a week in addition to their games, the reason Smink and his American pals were at the rink so much wasn't just to play hockey. The three also had to fulfill another part of their obligations, a rather humbling one at that.

"We'd have to clean up the rink, clean the locker rooms and clean the toilets," Smink said. "Then we'd have to help out with the public skating, kind of be rink guards. I was never tired of playing hockey, but I was sick of being at that rink."

Still, the job wasn't full time, and Smink ended up with a lot of free time on his hands, time he spent mostly sightseeing or just relaxing.

"I was rarely in a rush to ever get anywhere," he said.

Smink, who makes his home in Berwyn, likened his stay to a semester abroad, something he never got to do at Amherst because of his hockey commitment. He said it was an opportunity he was glad to grab.

"It's been a great year," he said. "I got to do whatever I wanted, and I was getting paid for playing hockey, which I think is incredible. I was very lucky, and it was great."






