LEAVING HOME



For the exceptionally talented ice hockey player in the Philadelphia area choices must be made in order to further one's career.

West Chester East's Vince Clevenger is one such player whose talent has created opportunities and has now accepted the challenge of playing New England prep school hockey.

If all goes as expected, by late summer, the goal-scoring, swift-skating Clevenger will find himself holed up at a New England boarding school, looking to make the next step in hockey.

"I thought I was pretty good, but then I saw some of the prep school players," said Clevenger, whose Junior Flyers midget team has often traveled to play teams from the New England Prep School League.

They're pretty much the top players on the East Coast who will go on to play Division I college hockey, and it makes you envy them and want to get better. I figure that if you want to get exposure, you're not going to get it by a coach aming all the way down here."

The 16-year-old Clevenger's playing skills have pretty much peaked against this area.

He's a clear standout in the Inter-County League, having won back-to-back regular-season scoring titles. In 15 games this season, he finished with 45 goals and 35 assists for 84 points, 17 points better than last season.

"He's real intense and can put the putt in the net," Junior Flyers coach Bud "He's not the fastest skater, but once he gets the puck in the offensive zone, he's dangerous. And this year he's really stepped up to be a leader."

Clevenger began playing hockey when he was about five years old. He saw a game on television and bugged his dad to take him skating. From the minute he stepped on the ice, there was never an ounce of frustration that is so typical to first-time skaters.

"All I remember was having so much fun," Clevenger recalled. "Falling was even better."

He soon joined a traveling team with the Quakers organization and stayed with it until he was in seventh grade, when he jumped over to the Junior Flyers, a traditional power among clubs in the area.

Two years later, he had the added opportunity to begin playing for East.

"Some guys I play with on the Junior Flyers take the high school leagues lighter, some seriously, and I take it seriously," said Clevenger, who is now 6-foot and 175 pounds. "On the Junior Flyers, you don't really hang out with the guys, but with East, it's all your friends and it's your school."

Despite having another year he could play for East, Clevenger knows that at this juncture his best bet is to head north, just as other area standouts have done, if he hopes to get a scholarship.

Ryan Mulhern left Malvern Prep his junior year and eventually wound up at The Canterbury School in New Milford, CT. There, he led the prep school league in scoring. He got drafted by the Calgary Flames, and he now attends Brown University, where he is a junior and the Bears top scorer.

Mulhern's brother, Matt, took the same route. He left Malvern for Canterbury, where he is now a senior. Next year, he expects to be playing at Boston College.

The most prominent Philadelphia-area native to journey through a prep school was Mike Richter. The Flourtown-born goalie – now a star with the New York Rangers – left Germantown Academy to attend Northwood Prep in lake Placid, N.Y., where he then earned a scholarship to the University of Wisconsin.

As for Clevenger, his hopes for a prep school include Canterbury, The New Hampton School in New Hampshire, and Lawrence Academy in Massachusetts. His personal choice would be Canterbury, where hockey coach Joe King said about a third of his players wind up with Division I scholarships and the rest go on to play at Division II and III schools.

"What's most important is that they're all good students," King said.

Although Clevenger won't find out until mid-March whether he gets accepted to Canterbury, the chances appear to be in his favor.

"He's a very talented player," said King, whose team is the prep school league's defending champion. "As a kid I really liked him, as did our admissions people. Everyone speaks very highly of him."

King has seen Clevenger play a few times. Last season, the Junior Flyers traveled to Canterbury, and even with King sitting his top line, the Saints still won easily, 10-1.

"I like his speed, his puck awareness and his vision on the ice," King said. "He has a lot of strengths that would help us, and I think he can be great at this level."

At the moment, Clevenger's mind is set on trying to win a Flyers Cup title for the Vikings and returning to the nationals with the Junior Flyers, all in what is likely to be a career with lifelong friends.

"I wish I could stick around, but I think they understand," Clevenger said.

Russo thinks Clevenger has the talent to go further and should follow his dream.

"Kids go to that next level and do one of two things: they either flop or excel," Russo said. "Vince isn't going to go there and be a superstar. It's going to take a while to adjust, and it's going to be tough, just the way the Mulherns worked their way up. But barring injury, I think he'll make it."

Clevenger senses what he can expect.

"I know it's going to be competitive, and I've got a long way to go, but I'm willing to work for it," he said. "I hope and pray for it every night."

THE HEAT IS ON by David T. Shaw

Whether battling fires or ice hockey opponents, all John loia asks is that you give it your all. It's his proven path to success.

The fire on Bainbridge Street had already engulfed the first two floors when the crew from Ladder 5 spotted an elderly man in a third-floor window.

Within minutes, company captain John loia had the man in his grasp, carrying him down a 35-foot ladder and through heavy flames that shot out the second-floor windows. Joia's face was scorched, his gloves burned through to his hands, but he got the man to a firefighter below.

For that rescue in 1973, loia was proclaimed a hero and received several awards. But as a Philadelphia firefighter for the past 32 years, loia knows such credit should go all around.

"Everybody relies on each other and gives 100 percent," he said. "And if they're not willing to, you learn real guick."

For loia, that philosophy carries over from fire to ice.

As a hockey coach for 18 years, the last 12 at Germantown Academy, Ioia has asked his players to skate as a unit and give 100 percent. Let the wins come



when they may is loia's thinking, but don't ever leave the ice knowing you didn't give it your all.

"If you're not going to give it your best effort, don't even do it," loia said. "Winning's important, but it's just as important to do the best job you can. If you know you gave everything, you can hold your head up."

Such wisdom has helped loia's teams earn three Suburban League titles and an overall record of 149-80-16. It also served to shake up local high school hockey last

season, when a Patriots team laden with juniors won the Flyers Cup championship.

"Over the last four years, we've had this group who since they were freshmen has stayed together, grown together," loia said. "They came out last year as juniors, a little bigger and more developed than the previous year, but we weren't a favorite to win the Flyers Cup by any stretch of the imagination. To do that was a pretty big achievement."

This season, with all but three of last season's players returning, the Patriots have already won the Suburban League regular-season championship, along with the league's playoff title. Through mid-March, they were 29-4.

Now they hope to win the Flyers Cup again, which would be the second time in the school's history that a Patriots team has won back-to-back titles at the Tier I level. The last Patriots teams to do so were the 1981-82 and 1982-83 squads.

"They're the big-time, front-running favorite," said Council Rock coach Paul Gilligan, whose team lost to GA in the league's playoff finals. "We've pretty



much played every one around in the high school league, and GA's loaded compared to them."

After years in which the Patriots struggled in the Suburban League, loia and his Patriots have been enjoying the past few seasons in which they finally came into contention as a power.

loia took over GA's program in 1984, the year after former coach Bruce Craig left after taking the team to two Flyers Cup titles and a state championship. But soon after, there was almost no team to coach at all.

"Although we still had (goaltender) Mike Richter, the team was just a skeleton of those champion teams," loia recalled. "And there were a couple of years after where our numbers dropped and it looked like it was all in jeopardy."

But just as unexpected as the sudden lack of players, the numbers again began to rise in the seasons that followed. The program has been healthy ever since, and loia has been having a ball.

loia, 54, began coaching hockey in the mid-1970s when his son, John Jr., started playing. The elder loia grew up in South Philadelphia and hardly even heard of the game, but quickly came to love it.

"This gave our family all something in common, and it was a great release from work," said loia, whose son went on to captain Penn State's hockey team and this season joined him on the bench as an assistant coach.

"I look forward to my nights at the ice rink. The kids are a part of my life for a little bit each week, and it keeps me young. I truly know I do it simply because I enjoy it."

His players seem to enjoy loia as well, and they appreciate what he's taught them about giving your all in life.

"We even took ourselves by surprise last year winning the Flyers Cup," said senor Rich Podulka, the team's captain and top-line center. "We weren't some egotistical powerhouse. We just played our game and came up big, and it was all-out or nothing.


"In the Flyers Cup, it was the third period that set us apart. Other teams would tire, but we would keep pushing. And that's what put us over the edge."

As a firefighter, loia could have retired nine years ago, but he has stayed on because he enjoys his work. He isn't certain just when he'll hang up his chief's hat.

One thing he is confident of, however, is that he'll be standing behind youngsters on a hockey bench for years to come.

"I don't know how I could ever get away from it," said loia, who, in addition to GA, has coached several all-star and club teams over the years.

"I enjoy it and look forward to it so much. I do get stressed by the end of the season, but about two weeks after, I'm anxious to get right back in it. I believe I'll be around a good long while."




